Is your home polluting Chorley's watercourses?

Action Douglas and Yarrow, in conjunction with the Environment Agency, is aiming to raise awareness of problems caused when domestic appliances are wrongly connected to the drains.

A wrong connection is most likely to occur if a homeowner has added an extension or a downstairs toilet. sink, washing machine, or dishwasher. Quite often these are plumbed into the rainwater drain meaning that wastewater could end up in local rivers polluting the water and harming local wildlife instead of being directed to the wastewater treatment works.



(Well It rained so much I got behInd with the weeding) This has been colonised by rather boring looking willowhwerb plants but I have been spectacularly rewarded by the arrival of an Elephant Hawk Moth Caterpillar. It is a beast! - 60mms long and with two sets of purple eyes. I have been able to terrorise visitors for the last few days with this glorious creature. According to the www it will emerge from its crysalis as a moth with a 70mm wingspan in beautiful shades of pink. What a payback for a bit of benign neglect!

Weapons of Mass Distraction (contd.)

Last summer we reported of property developers threatening people objecting to planning applications with libel action.

Recently, a local case was resolved with the complainant dropping the case shortly before a hearing in the Royal Courts of Justice. The complaint generated a legal expenses bill of almost £40,000 and the court awarded a sum of around £33,000 to the defendant. There have been a number of similar cases around the country as libel law requires the accused to prove their innocence which can be a costly exercise.

Anyone wishing to object to a planning application is strongly advised to check they have the appropriate legal expenses cover on their home insurance. You can make representations through the Parish Council in the strictest confidence.

Village Hall Lottery Bid

In April this year, the Village Hall Committee put together an application to the Big Lottery Fund for money to re-furbish and develop the Village Hall.

The bad news is that this application was unsuccessful! The good news is that there are other sources of funding out there – not such large amounts as the lottery – but every little helps.

The committee will continue to apply for grants and hold fund raising events in order to progress the improvements.
