SAND QUARRY FUNDING

Good news about funding the purchase of the Old Sand Quarry as a parish sporting amenity. Discussions have taken place with Mr Roger Handscombe of Chorley Borough Council about a possible compulsory purchase order. During these discussions it was stated that CBC would provide funds to assist the purchase.

The three Parish Councils of Whittle, Heapey and Wheelton are looking to raise £33,000 and CBC will cover the purchase price of the site over and above this sum. Confirmation of this offer will have to be given in writing before Cllr Dickenson of Wheelton PC can negotiate with the Charity Commissioners about the release of funds from the Heapey and Wheelton Charity Trust. Neighbourhood Watch

A Neighbourhood Watch group has been set up for and by the residents of Blackburn Road Heapey. The group is led by Frank Makinson of 150 Blackburn Rd and met for the first time on 24th June at St Chad's Parish Centre.

At this inaugural meeting, an inspector from Wheelton Police Station explained about the new schemes for Community Policing, outlining the role of community wardens and ended by saying that the scheme, currently being piloted in other parts of Lancashire, would be rolled out to more areas as funds became available. Our area has applied for some such funding and it could well be granted in the next round but she did not give any promises, only stressed that Chorley Division was committed to the idea.

One of the points made was the importance of reporting anything suspicious, as this area is a quiet one as far as the Divisional Headquarters can see from statistics. We stand a better chance of getting up the queue for money and resources if we are seen to be experiencing more crime. Don't fall into the trap of thinking "It isn't worth reporting things as they never do anything" is her message. If no one tells the police what is happening, they will never know and resources take time to move.

Margaret Rushton from the Neighbourhood Watch team at Divisional Headquarters in Chorley then talked about the ways in which we can protect our property and ourselves. The main point was to make it as difficult as possible for the potential criminal to get up to mischief. High hedges give privacy but they also prevent neighbours from seeing something suspicious; it is easy for an opportunist to make off with your car if you leave the engine running when you nip back into the house; the stepladders you leave outside unlocked can be used very easily to access your property by some one else. It is all common sense but we all lose it on occasion, and that is all the burglar needs, one occasion.

All those who live in the area covered will be informed of the date of the next meeting in due course and in the meantime, keep an eye on your neighbour's place and they will keep an eye on yours.

If you live in an area not covered by Neighbourhood Watch and are interested in setting up a scheme, contact Lancashire Police at either Chorley Police Station or HQ in Hutton and someone will be able to point you in the right direction.

Noise and Disturbances

Complaints have been received about frequent late night disturbances affecting houses near the Red Cat. The mobile CCTV unit is being requested to visit the scene. Complaints have also been received about loud music on Blackburn Rd. The complainants were referred to the Environmental Health dept.

Juvenile Nuisance

Chorley Borough Council is reviewing juvenile nuisance throughout the borough. The aim is to identify actions to reduce young people's involvement in nuisance activities and contribute to a greater feeling of safety within the community. Heapey Parish Council has now contributed to the review and looks forward to new initiatives in community safety.

FUNDING BID FOR EXTRA POLICE

We all want to see a return to policemen on the beat, so a funding bid has been submitted to provide two Community Beat Managers as an addition to existing police resources in the rural and Wheelton areas. The CBMs will spend the majority of time on foot or a bicycle, so you will be able to stop them and talk about your concerns or pass on information.

In addition to the CBMs there will be a Police Community Support Officer working alongside them. Their roles are to specifically manage and resolve problems highlighted on their beats. This is done through liaising directly with key stakeholders, community contacts, statutory and voluntary agencies.
